Update on the Tsunami appeal

Following the recent tsunami in South-East Asia, many theosophists contributed to an appeal to support the tsunami relief work being undertaken by the Theosophical Order of Service (T.O.S.) in Chennai, India. These donations were amalgamated and the T.O. S in Australia arranged for \$19 421 to be transferred to the Theosophical Society in Adyar for this work. This donation was composed of \$5 000 from the Pritchard Account funds held in trust for the T.O.S. in Australia by the TS in Australia, \$5 000 from the TS In Australia and \$9 421 donated to the TS in Australia and the T.O.S. in Australia for the Tsunami Appeal. Further donations have been received since this initial transfer was made and they will be transferred to Adyar in the next month.

Mr C.V.K.Maithreya, President of the T.O.S. in Chennai, has recently provided an update on the current tsunami relief work. The projects chosen by the T.O.S. in the rehabilitation phase include acquisition of reverse osmosis plants to provide drinking water and alternative vocational training for those affected by the tsunami. Tailoring is one of the skills being considered. The T.O.S. has brokered the donation of several reverse osmosis plants and is funding their running costs for 18 months. His reports and photographs are attached for your information and use in promoting the appeal. This is a long term project that will benefit from the continuing support of Australians.

Thanks to Georgina Fode and her National Committee

The role of the Director and the National TOS

Most organisations that maintain their vitality and focus throughout a long life regularly take time to reflect on their goals, the way they operate and their relationships both within the organisation and with the communities in which they work. This period of transition from one National Director to another provides a natural opportunity for all of us to re-examine this role and the contribution that it can make to the work of the T.O.S. in Australia. This is not to say that there is anything wrong with the ways the role has operated in the past but to take the opportunity to see if it needs to change in any way to better meet the needs of the current context.

It seems to me that the real strength of the T.O.S. lies in the work undertaken by groups at a local level. It is here that positive, harmonious relationships are developed and maintained with our communities. What then is the role of the National Director? Is it to facilitate networking and help local T.O.S. groups share

ideas and information? Do we need a National organisation in a formal sense, or do we need simply a way of networking the T.O.S. groups throughout Australia?

Could you please discuss these ideas within your local T.O.S. group and send your views to me. The following questions may help:

- What do you think the role of the National Director should be?
- How can the National Director best support the work of your local group?
- Do we need a National T.O.S. organisation that is separate from the local T.O.S. groups?

Service through volunteer work in our communities

Did you know that volunteers are often referred to as *the lifeblood of Australian communities*? They belong to the largest workforce in Australia, and according to the last census, their volunteer work is estimated to contribute an economic value of more than \$18 billion per annum. Volunteers come from all age-groups and more than 25% of older people contribute to the community through volunteer work. Volunteer work brings great satisfaction to the volunteer and often means a great deal to those whose lives the volunteer touches. For instance, the smile on the face of the resident in an aged care home when their 'special friend' visits is beyond value... and that smile will often last for hours after the visit.

We do not usually need to look far for opportunities to be of service to our communities. T.O.S. members are often active volunteers, contributing to their communities in a variety of ways that suit their interests and lifestyles. For instance, Brisbane members visit elderly people in nursing homes as part of the Community Visitor scheme. Others tutor recently arrived migrants, provide transport and friendship to cancer patients coming to Brisbane for treatment, teach elderly people new skills and contribute to activities at a work and meeting place for people with disabilities. In addition to these individual focuses, a group service activity can provide a sense of communal purpose for a T.O.S. group. In Brisbane, our main group activity is a monthly commitment to plant trees and care for a section of a reclamation site. As well as working together, we make sure that we include time for socialising over afternoon tea.

Please let me know the service activities that are proving to be successful for your T.O.S. group members, and I'll circulate them to increase our bank of ideas.
