As I receive the Annual Reports from our TOS Groups around Australia and look back over the year, I am impressed by the variety of interests in our different groups and the range of activities on which they focus. At the same time they share a commitment to action: to giving practical expression to their compassion through service to all life.

This is what our founder, Annie Besant envisaged when she founded the TOS. She did not intend the TOS to be formed of identical groups. Rather, she wanted the TOS to be a vehicle that enabled members of the

Theosophical Society to pursue issues of interest relevant to their communities, with the common thread being an agreement with the motto: 'Towards a union of those who love in the service of all that suffers.'

In this issue of the newsletter, as well as sharing news from within the TOS, we share ideas for service activities in 2010 related to four United Nations Days.

National TOS 2010 AGM

The Annual General Meeting of the National TOS will be held at **2.30 pm on Friday 22 January 2010** at the Australian Maritime College, Launceston, Tasmania. The National President of the TS in Australia, Dara Tatray, has decided that only activities of the Theosophical Society will be included in the TS Convention program. Because the TOS is a separate organisation, although very closely connected with the TS, the TOS AGM is therefore not included on the program printed in the last edition of *Theosophy in Australia*. However, Dara is closing the Convention program at mid-day on Friday 22 January. This will enable the TOS to hold its AGM on Friday afternoon.

One of the major items on the AGM's agenda is approval of the amendments to the National Constitution. As you would be aware from previous newsletters, this is the culmination of 18 months of work and consultation. Many thanks go to the National Council members who gathered the feedback and suggestions from their local TOS Groups. Thanks also go to all of you who contributed in your TOS Group.

The National Management Group (Janice Scarabottolo, Lynette Muller and myself) have gone through your input carefully and incorporated it into the revised Constitution. The International Secretary of the TOS, Diana Dunningham Chapotin, has also provided feedback and confirmed that the constitution is compatible with international requirements.

Update on our national projects

The SEE Project in India

We have recently had news from Chennai about the impact of our support of the SEE Project. The funds we have provided so far have enabled the Chennai TOS to organise events in three slum areas to screen residents for eye problems. In total, staff from the Udhi Eye Hospitals examined 499 people. Of these, 204 were provided with spectacles and 11 had cataract eye surgery performed.

What a difference, your generosity has made to their lives!!

News from around our Australian groups Melbourne TOS Group

Melbourne TOS members have been active on a number of fronts during the year. In the aftermath of the devastating Victorian bush fires, they rallied support and collected clothes, blankets and children's toys for those affected.

They raised funds for several local animal and social welfare groups as well as making donations to the Golden Link College in the Philippines, the Olcott Memorial School in Adyar and the National TOS projects in India and Pakistan. The Melbourne TS also generously supported these international projects.

One of the social highlights of the year was their annual picnic in the beautiful Melbourne Botanical Gardens. During the picnic, they held a *peace and healing meditation* under the trees and raised awareness of the Australian Conservation Foundation which their TOS group supports.



Several members have been engaged in innovative service work. Tim Falkner chairs a charity, *Know the Odds*, that educates school children about the harmful effects of problem gambling. Michael Ryan contributes a lot of time to the *Men's Shed Network* that provides educational programs, volunteering opportunities and social and recreational activities for older men.

Another member, Gloria Keh, even finds time to volunteer in Singapore. She reports:

Since September 2007, regular sessions on Colour Therapy have been held at the AWWA Community Home for Senior Citizens. Lasting for two hours, each session has been facilitated by TOS member, Gloria Keh.

Participants, averaging around 10 per session, comprise both male and female residents of the Home.

During the sessions, residents work on specific designs on particular themes, dabbling in colours and working on the concept of a 'circle' format, to promote Oneness, and develop one-pointedness. It is indeed a joy to see residents working in focus on their drawings, whilst having a play with colours.

AWWA Home was founded in 1976 to provide sheltered housing for the single elderly. Housed in one of the major suburbs of Singapore, the Home accommodates 136 elderly, whilst providing a friendly environment for self-help and fostering mutual care among its residents.

AWWA Home is part of the Asia Women's Welfare Association that's dedicated to provide "a helping hand" to those in need in the community.

Adelaide TOS Group

Members of the Adelaide TOS Group have been busily collecting books for the Golden Link College run by the TOS in the Philippines. Travis James, the group's Coordinator, reports that the group has collected around 60kg of books so far.

The Golden Link College will be building its library collection for many years to come. The College needs story and information books for primary school aged children, novels and subject area books for secondary students and books for the new teacher education course, so the book donation from Adelaide will be most welcome.

Brisbane TOS Group



A book and CD on Guided Meditation have recently been written and published by Dr. K Arunachalam. He has taught meditation at the Brisbane TS for many years and is an active member of the TOS.

Aru has generously donated his work to the Brisbane TOS. After paying the printing costs, all profit from sales will go to the National TOS Projects. The set of book and accompanying CD sells for \$12. Copies will be available at the National AGM in Launceston.

The Brisbane TOS supports one of the city's refuges for homeless women. Throughout the year the TOS group provides bags of non-perishable groceries and personal care items for women who are moving from the refuge into long-term housing. The groceries are accompanied by a small recipe book for healthy eating. This gift not only makes each woman feel special but also lessens the financial challenge of the first weeks of independent living.

Although this was intended to be a 'gold coin donation' workshop, many attendees gave generous donations towards the literacy home-schools.

United Nations related activities


The United Nations shares many of the aspirations of the TOS. It was built on spiritual principles and universal values such as peace, human rights, human dignity and worth, justice, respect, good neighbourliness, freedom, respect for nature and shared responsibility.

The themes of the following four days relate to our TOS service areas of social welfare and the environment. They could provide ideas for service activities ranging from simply sharing promotional material to initiating a long term project.

February 20 World Day of Social Justice

What are the social justice issues in your community? Do you feel passionate about issues such as child abuse, homelessness in your city or the well-being of our Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples? Are there other groups with which you could join to promote awareness of the issues and to explore options for addressing them?

World Day of Social Justice was celebrated for the first time in 2009. It provides an opportunity for all of us to say that a safer, more secure and ultimately more prosperous world is possible, if emphasis is placed on social justice – poverty eradication, promotion of full employment and decent work, gender equity and access to social well-being and justice for all.



March 8 International Women's Day

International Women's Day is a day of global celebration – an opportunity to recognise the many different contributions that women make to our communities and the progress that has been made in many countries to give women equal rights and opportunities as citizens. There is no room for complacency, however, as women in numerous countries continue to face inequity on many fronts.

The educational sponsorships and literacy homeschools organised by the Pakistan TOS make a real difference to the lives of many women. By providing educational opportunities, these projects help them gain a measure of control over their lives and enable some to escape the cycle of poverty. Our collective donations to support these projects are therefore particularly worthwhile.

April 22 Earth Day

The first Earth Day was celebrated in 1970 at the Spring Equinox in March when traditionally the UN Peace Bell is rung at the exact moment of the Equinox. It is a time for remembering that we are one human family and collectively are trustees of the Earth. For the last few years, Earth Day has been celebrated on April 22.

On Earth Day we share ideas for acting as Earth Trustees in our daily lives to help peace, justice and the care of Earth. We commit to making choices in our daily conduct that will foster harmony, lessen pollution, diminish waste and assist nature. For example, we might walk more, use cars less, buy less, grow some of our own food, recycle, plant a tree, etc. We might work with other groups to help to further these goals.

In 2010, the campaign - *A Billion Acts of Green* - celebrates the 40th anniversary of the first Earth Day. Organisers hope that a billion people around the world will register their individual carbon reduction acts. This is intended to make a bold statement on climate that governments cannot ignore.

May 15 International Day of Families

This annual observance was instituted in 1993 to highlight the importance which the international community attaches to families as basic units of society as well as its concern regarding their situation around the world.

The International Day of Families provides an opportunity to promote awareness of issues relating to families as well as to promote appropriate action.

We could celebrate this day by holding an event for our TOS and TS families to celebrate the joys and benefits of family life. It might lead us to adopt a refugee family or to partner with another community organisation that supports refugees. We might decide to use the International Day of Families to promote awareness of a related social problem such as domestic violence and publicise support networks.
